Outcomes Report

OVERVIEW

Nundah Community Enterprises Cooperative (NCEC) provides meaningful work for people with cognitive disabilities who were long-term unemployed, having fallen through gaps in the employment system. This is achieved through employment generating businesses. We measure performance by the sustainability of our businesses and the quantity and *quality* of employment we create.

We adopt a *depth* approach to social impact, creating jobs for those whom the private market and funded programs have been unable to assist. In addition to the label of intellectual disability, many of our staff face additional complex barriers to finding and keeping a job, including psychological and physical disability, homelessness and current or past involvement with the justice system and/or child safety.

Our leadership is demonstrated in being awarded Australia's best Social Enterprise in 2015 (small) and 2020 (large) and being winner of a Brisbane Lord Mayor's Business Award for Social Enterprise (2023).

ENTERPRISE OUTCOMES

2024 was a year of stabilisation and preparing of our businesses for the next stage of growth. Whilst losses were recorded in our café and catering businesses and youth co-op, they were reduced from previous years. Our gardening and landscaping businesses continued to perform, based on a stable and diversifying contract base, free rental at our depots and support in the purchasing of equipment from generous philanthropic donors.

Whilst the cooperative made a loss of 3% this year, we have made a valuable investment in growth of the cooperative and in our city café which is now trading well. The co-operative has retained earnings of \$687,102 which enable us to manage this downturn. Overall, the Co-operative remains a going concern but focus on businesses profitability is a key to long term sustainability and ensuring future growth in impact.

STAKEHOLDEROUTCOMES/SOCIAL-IMPACT

NCEC continues to operate according to the model outlined in a Social Return on Investment (SROI) report in 2011, which found employment in the Co-op to be 'highly valuable' to its members - achieving an SROI ratio of 3.31: 1 (indicating that for every \$1 of investment in the cooperative \$3.31 of social value is created). NCEC maintains its commitment to measuring social impact by reporting annually according to quantitative and qualitative measures.

QUANTITATIVE MEASUREMENTS-DIRECTEMPLOYMENT

Measurement of employment (hours) and wages (dollars) for calendar year 2024 is as follows:

Work created for members* = 21,242 (hours) increased from 19,239 hours in 2023 (*members who were from disadvantaged backgrounds and formerly long-term unemployed. Primarily people experiencing intellectual disability/mental illness)

Payments to members* \$559, 616 increased from \$522,182 in 2023.

Work roles created / sustained for members = 55 increased from 51 in 2023.

QUALITATIVE MEASUREMENTS-DIRECTEMPLOYMENT

In 2016, NCEC embarked on a three-year research partnership with the University of Queensland (UQ) to document outcomes for workers within the co- operative as well as our model of sustainable job creation. The study had two key findings:

- 1) The majority of participants acknowledged they had an increased sense of belonging, happiness and confidence in comparison to past experiences of work.
- 2) The Cooperative culture encourages members to have a say, values them for who they are, and supports their independence as well as building of supportive connections within the local community.

The findings of this research were published in a leading academic journal 'Disability and Society' on May 3rd 2019. In 2021, NCEC embarked on a 'theory of change' review with support of Social Impact Hub (SIH) and this is being updated currently with support from consultants at Good Wolf Partners.

VOICES FROM THE RESEARCH

"I get a vote I get to vote and have a say, if I think something's not right, I can put up my hand and say, 'hey I disagree with this".

"I Feel good because I've done something for myself and proud because I've done something for the community"

"This job has helped me become the person I am".

TRAINING AND ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT:

- In 2024 NCEC supported the growth of <u>Caboolture Community Work</u> <u>Cooperative</u> (which has a mission similar to NCEC) through mentoring thanks to support of a 'Bunya Fund' grant.
- NCEC managed an 'Employment Pathways for Refugee Integration' (EPRI)
 program funded by Department of Home Affairs which exceeded its
 employment and training targets and has been refunded for an additional
 year.
- We partnered with Community Living Association Inc (CLA) on a <u>pre-employment and training project</u> for youth with disability facing complex disadvantage, supported by the Paul Ramsay Foundation (PRF) which will end in September 2025.
- We also partnered with CLA on a <u>Skilling Queenslanders for Work (SQW)</u>
 <u>program</u> hosting SQW trainees in our businesses and offering of hands-on work
 experience to them. 65% of participants found employment post-training (a
 much higher rate of success than other systems).
